DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Interior - rectangular building of handmade brick (random bond) with field-stone foundation, granite steps and gable roof. Four bays long of 12 over 12 rectangular windows with many original panes all surmounted by flat brick arches. Two original pine front doors (paneled and beveled) and put together with pegs. On front facade and at the second floor level are three small windows, now closed with brick. Beautiful molded brick cornices. Old shutter iron work remains.

Interior - flat ceiling of random-width boards. Side aisles lead to raised pulpit platform. Old original pews, pine floor, and lock on front door. Chamfered central post. Area behind pulpit is divided into church school class^{rooms} which contain old mortise and tenon benches.

In the churchyard is a granite marker to Revolutionary soldiers from Catholic.

Cemetery contains many old markers and is surrounded by a field-stone wall.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Historically and architecturally significant is this old brick church which, after its organization in 1759, served the area's first settlers (mostly Scotch-Irish Presbyterians) and later sent an impressive number of soldiers from its congregation to fight in the Revolution. Still in use today, the church has one of the State's longest records of continuous service.

One of the first churches in up-country South Carolina, known as the "Mother of Churches" in this area, Catholic Presbyterian was also the mother of other churches founded in Ohio, Indiana, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama and Arkansas by members who migrated to these states.

Present church building, third on site, completed 1842 by Irish emigre David Lyle, is an excellent example of meeting-house architecture. Remaining virtually as built, of hand-pressed brick, building displays such original features as molded brick cornices, pegged front doors, pine floors and pews.

Organized 1759 by the Rev. William Richardson, who chose the name Catholic to embrace all Presbyterians, both Original-Church and Reformed. Richardson, who emigrated from England to America in 1750, was supply pastor for Catholic Presbyterian until his death in 1771. Succeeding pastors included the Rev. James Campbell,



8. Significance

first regular Presbyterian pastor in North Carolina, and the Rev. William Martin, first Covenanter minister ordained in Ireland and first to settle in the South, later appointed to Reformed Presbytery of Scotland committee to manage church affairs in America. (The Covenanters, although narrow and doctrinaire, deserve credit for defending liberty through years of arbitrary and despotic history).

Well-kept, peaceful cemetery, surrounded by field-stone wall, has many weather beaten markers. A granite marker, erected 1933 by Catholic's Memorial Association, lists names of 62 soldiers from the church who fought in the Revolutionary War.
