Description Monticello Methodist Church, which was constructed ca. 1861, is a one-story, gable-roofed, weatherboarded frame building with a meeting house floor plan. The facade end of the gable is pedimented with a boxed cornice, plain frieze, and has a semicircular gable vent. The portico is supported by octagonal wooden columns. The facade has three doors topped by pointed-arched, modern stained glass transoms. The central entrance also has modern stained glass sidelights above wooden panels. The side elevations have multi-light, shuttered windows. There is a cemetery to the left of the church.

Significance According to a history of Monticello Methodist Church, the building was constructed in 1861 by Jacob Bookman.¹ It is significant as a very intact example of a mid-nineteenth-century rural church building. The interior retains the original pews as well as the former slave gallery on three walls.
