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### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Christ Episcopal Church was constructed in 1859 and is an excellent vernacular example of the "Carpenter Gothic" style of architecture.

Cruciform in plan, the church is of board and batten construction and rests upon low brick piers. The roof is steeply pitched with simple wooden brackets supporting the eaves. Windows and doors are pointed-arched, in the Gothic Revival style, and feature simple wooden tracery.

Entrances are located on both sides of the structure, in the projecting transepts. An entrance is also located at the northern end of the structure (at the rear of the church). Attached to this facade is a small wing which serves both as a vestry room and a cover for the door.

Ca. 1945 the wooden shingled roof was replaced by composition shingles. The original windows were replaced by the existing transparent glass ca. 1955.

INTERIOR: The interior of the church is simple and virtually unaltered. The walls are plaster, and floors are heart pine. The steeply pitched wooden ceiling is supported by exposed cross bracing. The original pine pews, altar rail, and other church furniture have been preserved.

SURROUNDINGS: The church is located in a formerly rural area which is now beginning to show signs of development. Adjacent to the church and included within the nominated acreage is the cemetery which contains the graves of many of the original parishioners and their descendants.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Located in rural Florence County, South Carolina, Christ Episcopal Church is an excellent example of a vernacular interpretation of the Gothic Revival style of architecture (also known as "Carpenter Gothic"). The church is also exemplary of the small and frequently isolated churches in South Carolina which have played an important part in the religious and social life of their surrounding communities.

The history of Christ Church began ca. 1843 when Dr. Edward Porcher, formerly of the lower part of the state, was successful in arranging for Episcopal services to be held in the Mars Bluff community. In 1859 Dr. Porcher gave two acres of land on which the present church was erected. On June 5, 1859, Rev. Thomas Frederick Davis consecrated Christ Church. Families associated with the church included Greggs, Bacots, Ashbys, Harllees, Rogers, McCalls and others.

For the next fifty years Christ Church maintained an active, although small, congregation. With the organization and growth of St. John's Episcopal Church in the nearby town of Florence, membership at Christ Church declined. Ca. 1918 the church was closed, although interest in it has remained strong since that time. In the 1930's Bible classes were held in the church, and in the 1940's services were occasionally held. In 1950 Christ Church was reorganized as a mission and continues to be so today. With this reorganization, much effort has been made to keep the church in good repair. Services are now held regularly.

ARCHITECTURE: Christ Church is an excellent vernacular example of the "Carpenter Gothic" style of architecture. Erected in 1859, the church is of board and batten construction and features pointed arched windows and doors, as well as exposed roof bracing. Also typical of the style are the wooden brackets, the steeply pitched roof, and the simple wooden tracery.

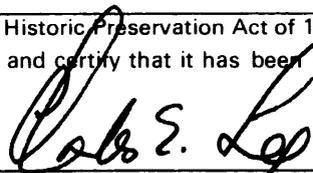
