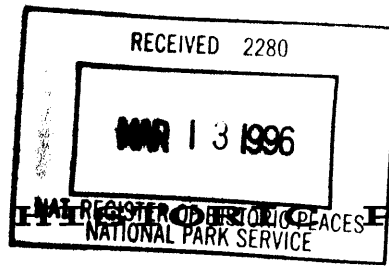

The Palmetto Theater, at 172 East Main Street in Spartanburg, was built in 1940 and is a one-story, rectangular plan brick building with a built-up roof on bow-string trusses and a stepped stucco facade. Exterior features include a large marquee, theater entrance recess and a separate shop storefront decorated in Carrera-glass panels in varying shades of blue. Interior features include double balconies, an entrance lobby and mezzanine restrooms featuring Terrazzo flooring laid in an intricate colorful pattern, decorative wall painting, large Art Deco light fixtures, and an Art Deco plaster screen surround. The ceiling, seating area, and stage have deteriorated due to rain and weather damage from holes in the roof.

The Palmetto Theater, built in 1940, is significant for its technological advances and as an excellent example of the theater designs of Erle G. Stillwell (1885-1978), a Hendersonville, North Carolina, architect who specialized in movie theaters. Stillwell, one of the principals in the firm Six Associates, Inc., of Asheville, also designed ten other theaters in South Carolina in the 1930s and 1940s--in Anderson, Clinton (the Young Theater), Columbia (the Center, Five Points, Palmetto, and Ritz Theaters), Greenville (the Poinsett Theater), Greenwood, and Sumter).¹

The Palmetto Theater included the latest in design for its patrons, including state-of-the-art projection and sound equipment, air conditioning, and a staggered placement of seats so that no patron's view of the screen would be blocked by the patron sitting in front of them, and hard-of-hearing-aids and other aids for the disabled.²

Erle G. Stillwell was a native of Hannibal, Missouri. He attended the United States Naval Academy, the University of North Carolina, Cornell University, and the University of Pennsylvania. He also studied and traveled in England, Scotland, France, Italy, and Greece. Stillwell began his career as a draftsman in an architectural firm in Atlanta and went into private practice as an architect in 1916. In 1942, after 26 years in private practice, Stillwell became one of the principals of Six Associates, Inc., of Asheville. He was elected president of the firm in 1950. Stillwell became a member of the American Institute of Architects in 1916 and was named a Fellow of the AIA in 1942. He served the North Carolina Chapter of the AIA as Secretary-Treasurer (1917-1921 and 1934-37) and as President (1922-23 and 1942-44) and is the only member of the chapter ever elected to serve second terms in either office.³

Verbal Boundary Description

All that lot of parcel of land on the northwest corner of East Main Street and North Liberty Street in the City of Spartanburg and being more particularly described as follows:

Beginning at a point at the inner edge of the sidewalk at the intersection of North Liberty Street and East Main Street and running thence along the north side of East Main Street S. 75-15 W. 50-07 feet to a point; thence N. 14-45 W. 136 feet to a point at the inner edge of the sidewalk on Dunbar Street; thence N. 75-15 E. 46.15 feet to an iron pin at the intersection of the sidewalk on Dunbar Street and North Liberty Street; thence S. 16-25 E. 136 feet to the point of beginning and being more particularly shown on plat for W.E. Burnett Estate, et al. by H. Stribling dated November 1, 1945 and recorded in Plat Book 14, page 20, R.M.C. Office for Spartanburg County, South Carolina.

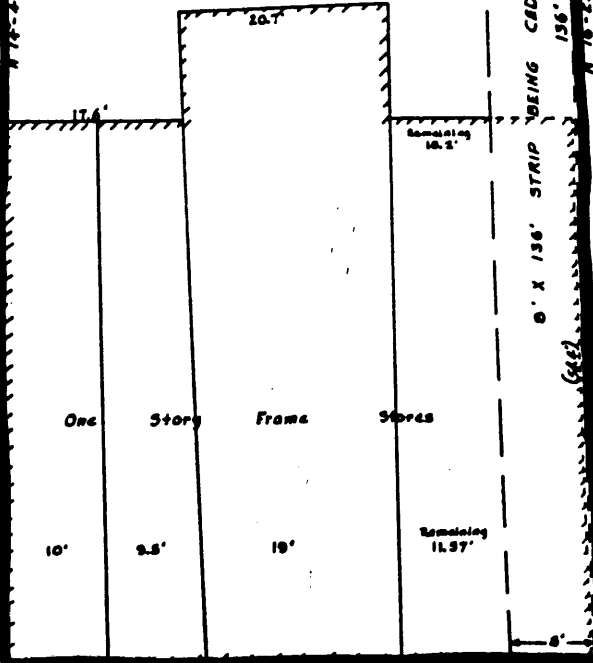
