#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Ebenezer Academy is a brick rectangular structure of simple design which measures sixty by forty feet. The bricks are laid in common bond pattern on a coursed fieldstone foundation varying from one to two feet in height. The roof is gabled with boxed cornices. At each end of the building are two interior chimneys, one on each slope. Entrances on both of the longer sides of the building have double doors with transoms and fieldstone lintels. There are eighteen windows, all of which are 12/12 with plain facings. The four windows in each of the gable ends are surmounted by brick voussoirs.

The interior is composed of three rooms: one large classroom and two smaller rooms. There are four fireplaces, the two in the large room being built entirely of brick.

In the late 1960s Ebenezer Academy, which had fallen into disrepair, was renovated.

<u>Surroundings</u>: Ebenezer Academy is located on the grounds of Ebenezer Presbyterian Church. Approximately six yards away lies the Ebenezer Cemetery, bordering the school on two sides. Here are buried many of the school's former instructors, students, and trustees.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Located on the grounds of Ebenezer Presbyterian Church (founded 1785), Ebenezer Academy is the oldest known school building standing in York County, South Carolina. Part of a trend which established academies throughout the South. Ebenezer's history has been traced to the early 19th Century. Called by one historian "an institution of English origin adapted to the needs of the Southern frontier...,"1 the early academy offered young men college preparatory classes with an emphasis on the classics. The Presbyterians were particularly active in establishing academies, and Ebenezer was one of their schools. It offered college preparatory courses in the classics and sciences and later enlarged its curriculum to include history, English grammar, geography and mathematics. Although the present structure was not built until 1860 (to replace the earlier structure which had burned), Ebenezer represents a type of institution which flourished in the South during the first half of the 19th Century and which declined at the end of that century with the growth of public education.

It is not known exactly when Ebenezer Academy was founded, although an 1888 account traced its beginning back to 1819 and said it may have been in existence even earlier. In 1823 an advertisement for the school claimed: healthy and beautiful seite [sic]--Board good and very convenient--Scientific apparatus--An academical Library of 170 volumes: --all are invitations to Ebenezer."<sup>2</sup> In 1824 the South Carolina Legislature vested \$10,000 worth of escheated property in York District to the trustees of the academy.

The school apparently grew steadily, and in 1848 its incorporation was renewed by the South Carolina legislature. In 1859 the Yorkville Enquirer reported that the academy had burned and that classes would be held in

the church. An 1860 advertisement in the same paper notified the public that the school had been rebuilt: "It is a large and commodious brick building, with three apartments, well ventilated, and is furnished with every convenience necessary..."<sup>3</sup>

According to one account, a primary school was held in Ebenezer during the War Between the States. After the war, the academy apparently continued to provide college preparatory courses for young men. Ca. 1875 the academy became co-educational.

Distinguished alumni of Ebenezer included Andrew B. Moore, a judge and Governor of Alabama; George Washington Williams (1808-1868) a prominent lawyer, State Senator and member of the South Carolina House of Representatives; Archibald Ingram Barron (1807-1887) a medical doctor and signer of the Ordinance of Secession; and Thomas Jefferson Withers (1804-1865) a judge and member of the Secession Convention.

When Rock Hill public schools were established ca. 1888, the academy was leased to York County for an elementary school, a use which continued until 1950 when it was deeded back to the church. In the late 1960s the academy was renovated.
